

#### **AWARDS**

You may not be alone in feeling like it's easier to get a pilot's license than apply for an FFGC award. Almost, but not quite. First, the awards committee is fine-tuning the paperwork. Most awards have the same deadline of November 23 so the committee has time and you have time but, for now, read through *Awards & Descriptions* (on the WEB link) so you can find an award that already aligns with your club activities—or to what you might aspire to do.

The FFGC WEB page contains descriptions and rules you need to become familiar. Linked on that page are the THREE DOCUMENTS to guide you.

- 1. Awards & Descriptions
- 2. Rules & Procedures
- 3. The Award Application Form

There is a link to the Comparative Chart that shows when you are eligible to also apply for Deep South Garden Clubs and/or National Garden Club awards.

Final judging on last year's applications is occurring right now for awards to be given at the Convention. More to come on this topic to prepare you for the November deadlines.

**CLUB AWARD LISTINGS** 

#### FFGC BOARD REPORTS FROM JANUARY MEETING

Awards—140 Adult Awards Applications were received this year. Mary Whisler, FFGC 3rd Vice-president, received 30 Yearbook Awards for judging!

BLUE STAR MARKERS—Since September 2022, three new markers were dedicated and one new Gold Star Memorial Marker was ordered. A detailed history of the Blue Star Memorial program, and the process of having one installed in your town, is now available on the NGC website or download the pdf here.

Dues—By the Numbers as of Jan 2023 There are 155 clubs | 9,204 individuals | 651 life members | 432 spouse members = 10,187 total

ENDANGERED | INVASIVE PLANTS—Many people cannot identify or know how to handle species that have been deemed by the Florida Invasive Species Council as either Category 1 or Category 2 invasives. As of 2019, those lists included 81 Category 1 and 85 Category 2 invasives. Using those lists is problematic for most gardeners. Lydia Barbour reorganized the invasive plant list and translated the scientific name into a common name. That list is now in use by the Florida Native Plant Society and local native plant nurseries and soon by the Florida Wildflower Foundation. You can download your own copy here.

FFGC 100TH ANNIVERSARY—Donations came from 14 individual \$1,000 donors and \$970 from other individual donations, \$1,000 donations from four districts, and \$1,271 other districts, \$3,100 from judges' councils donating \$1,000, and another \$300 from other judges' councils' donations, \$7,936 from clubs and circles and another \$1,880 from other donations for a grant total of \$33,700 to date! THE FLORIDA GARDENER—A motion was made to host the magazine online only effective with the Fall issue and offer a mailed, printed version for the current subscription rate of \$15. The #1 rationale was to enable a more engaging magazine that expanded coverage and #2 to convert it from a loss to a profit budget item. It was decided to investigate several things further, which is underway. Anyone is capable of having the best idea, so if you have an idea to share, please email the <u>Editor</u>.

NGC Environmental School, but FFGC has a state chair who

works with Districts and local chairpersons to plan and deliver a series of Environmental School Courses. Currently there are two active schools, Fort Myers in District IX and Tampa in District VIII. District I is considering beginning a school in the latter part of this year. The goal is to teach environmental literacy through a variety of courses. Learn all the details <u>online</u> or <u>contact</u> Lydia Barbour, the FL chair.

PENNY PINES PROJECT—NGC and the USDA Forest Service formed a partnership to sustain our national and urban forests through this reforestation/forest education program. Local garden clubs donate funds and the Forest Service plants trees in areas that need them. Florida ranks #1 as biggest donor to the program. Learn more.

SCHOLARSHIPS—Six scholarships were awarded at \$1,500 each. Donations to the scholarship fund were given by the garden clubs of *Ft. Pierce, Jean Hawa, and Gulf Coast for a total of \$15,000*. This fund, started in 1989-91, awards annual scholarships to qualified college students. Donations are tax deductible and donations of \$100 or more are acknowledged in *The Florida Gardener* magazine and the donor is honored with a certificate at the district meeting. Donations of \$1,000 or more are acknowledged at the state convention. Contributors of \$20,000 or more will have a scholarship named in their honor. The deadline for FFGC is May 1 and information is on the FFGC website. Encourage your local students to apply!

STRATEGIC PLANNING COMMITTEE—The SPC considers many topics designed to streamline, modernize and energize the FFGC. Your experiences and suggestions are valuable. Feel free to drop a note to Committee Chairperson, <u>Gina Jogan</u>.

TRICOUNCIL—Tri-Council has big plans for the FFGC Convention in April. The emphasis will be on President Marge Hendon's theme of Recycling. Tri-Council members are dreaming up creative ways to repurpose, recycle, and compost materials rather than let them end up in landfills. Recycled art will be on display at the convention. At the Early Arrivals Dinner, attendees will be regaled with a Trashion Show. Models will design and model their own fashions out of recycled items. So far, seventeen models have signed up. President-Elect Tina Tuttle will be the emcee.

Maria Wilson, the county Forestry Agent will be the speaker, and she will instruct the planting of the tree.

VALPARAISO GARDEN CLUB organized a field trip, thanks to Gail Baker, programs chair, to Elgin Air Force Base/Jackson Guard for a tour of the native garden, museum, and feeding the deer. In the spring, the club will host a workshop on self-watering planter buckets. They will also host a plant sale April 29 at the Heritage Museum Garden, in conjunction with Saturday in the Park. They will host a party to celebrate their 70th Emerald Precious Metal anniversary.

District I hosted a Scholarship Workshop in January. We had two presenters; club members who each have several years' experience awarding scholarships for their respective clubs. The presenters were Debbie Michel of the Green Thumb Garden Club and Gail Baker of the Valparaiso Garden Club.

DEFUNIAK SPRINGS GARDEN CLUB has increased membership to 35. At the City Festival of Trees, their entry, decorated with dried fruit ornaments, took third place. Upcoming programs include making seed bombs and natural fire colorants and a field trip to the Florida Pioneer Family Heritage Farm to view the Cotton Geese.

DESTIN GARDEN CLUB installed new officers at their January meeting, and welcomed new president, Lee Vanderpool. The club will host their annual plant sale in April at the Destin Library. Velda Dougherty applied for and won a \$1,000 Plant America Grant from NGC for a new Japanese Memorial Garden at the library.

joining us since last May. A special thank you to Kathy Edge, GTGC Treasurer, who also chairs our Publicity and Website activities, for getting the word out to the Walton County community. Kathy's publicity efforts include monthly news releases; 80% of new members sign up on the website; word of mouth, our best tool for advertising; and visiting guests and programs that appeal to the public and are advertised.

MILTON GARDEN CLUB will install Jenny Weber as the new District Director at the May 9 Spring District Meeting. The theme of the meeting will be *Mamma Mia*, and we are assured there will be laughter, singing and dancing. The club will host a field trip to The Soundside Foundation Nature Preserve in Gulf Breeze and include a picnic and walk through the Camellia Trail.



Pensacola Federation Of Garden Clubs received a District I grant of \$250 to assist with their foundation planting as part of their recovery from Hurricane Sally. They were pleased to return to their annual hosting of *Gardening in the Panhandle*, a full day of workshops and lunch. March 14 and 15 will again see their *Tour of Tables* event provided to nurture interest in floral design and the art of tablescapes with themes from around the world. May 20 and 21 will feature the return of their annual "Secret Garden Tour," which is open to the public.



Ken Pines will be delving deep into all things bromeliads by going on a behind the scenes tour of a Bromeliad nursery as all District XII clubs pursue further education.



#### Q&A's WITH SUZI, JOYCE & SHARON—OUTGOING DISTRICT DIRECTORS

### Q: What was your initial interest in serving as district director (DD)?

**SUZI**: I held several officer positions over many years, and professionally owned my own business. I love to interact and encourage others and did so through the DD position. **JOYCE**: I wanted to create some district wide events, and to have clubs work together and share ideas.

**SHARON:** I was recruited by a former Director. I had no intimate knowledge of the post but could not refuse Becky Schuberth. I had just retired and wanted to become more involved. I figured I could best serve in a capacity where I felt the support of long-time members.

### Q: How did reality of the position differ from what you expected?

**SUZI:** The pandemic was a huge obstacle towards building relationships. Zoom is not a platform for socializing but we did get the business accomplished. Plus, I am a speaker, a people person. Writing/editing are not my forte. We are all gifted in different areas, and I do know my abilities.

JOYCE: Our District Flower Show was more than I could have imagined. The talent across the district was fantastic. Everyone, working together, was an incredible learning experience and they learned from each other. Our publicity chairperson for the event created a database of all the press release contact information, all the club websites and Facebook contacts. This was then shared with all the clubs to help with their future events.

SHARON: I was overwhelmed. The previous Director handed over her correspondence but I had no basis for understanding what was ahead of me. The relationship with the "State" was daunting. It took about six months before I felt familiar and comfortable in my role.

# Q: How did you learn that you could move up? Did you ask? Were you asked by someone else?

**SUZI**: While serving on the District VI Board, the Nominating Committee asked if I would serve. They knew my background. Being club president or having experience on your District board will be extremely helpful. Having access to former DDs for exchanging ideas and feedback is great encouragement for a new director. Monthly meetings would also be beneficial.

**JOYCE:** It is such a mistake to wait to be invited. I spent my entire 24 years in Florida waiting to be recognized and invited. If you are interested in something, let one of the leaders know. I had a reputation in Colorado as an organizer, but no one knew me here.

**SHARON:** I did not learn I could move up to Director. I was simply asked to fill the role.

### Q: What are the most important attributes or skills should a district director have?

**SUZI:** Patience, flexibility, kindness, confidence, public speaking ability, organization, leadership skills, and computer skills. I later understood I would need to contribute articles for *Florida Gardener* and write reports for FFGC.

JOYCE: (1) a car that gets great gas mileage and a set of good tires. My district meetings are often 2.5 hours away. The growth of the District caused long trips to attend a meeting that nobody wants to do; (2) a ZOOM account. Meeting on ZOOM has been a life saver; and (3) the ability to LISTEN. Just listen and work on a solution—get back to them. The wrong response is "that's the way it's always been done." I hate it when I hear that within our organization, so I never give that unhelpful answer.

SHARON: You must reach out to each club and genuinely appreciate their individual situations. I think you need to attend as many of their meetings/functions as possible and be available to help. Writing skills and time management are a must.

# Q: I'm assuming you have attended a convention. How would you encourage new members to attend?

SUZI: I have attending FFGC Conventions for seven years. I ask club presidents to invite their successor to Convention. If necessary, supplementing their resources to attend. A personal invitation makes all the difference. Invite them to sit with you at workshops, business meetings, and luncheons. During my tenure as DD, I held an annual seminar. Together, we worked through a binder full of information, including Convention attendance. I made it fun and they said they it was worth it.

**JOYCE:** The conventions with the Statewide Flower Shows are the best value of the trip. Quality workshops and lunch and dinner speakers are critical. Also, the awards and recognitions at the convention are huge. It would be great to hear newer names.

**SHARON:** I was thrilled to be at the last convention. I had been to one before but there wasn't a flower show, and I felt the lack of creativity. This last convention was joyous. The programs were wonderful and I felt more interaction with the state officers. I encourage everyone I know to attend convention—the photography exhibit should visually stimulate attendees.

#### ADVOCACY IN ACTION

#### WATERKEEPERS FLORIDA'S BIG WIN FOR WATER

#### A BIG WIN FOR FLORIDA WATER

Waterkeepers Florida, chaired by Matanzas Riverkeeper, and in partnership with Environmental Defense Alliance, sent a petition to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) urging the agency acknowledge that Florida's water quality standards were woefully outdated and urgently in need of revision. EPA issued a determination that agreed with us. The determination identified 40 priority toxic pollutants with outdated standards that need to be updated and 37 priority toxic pollutants for which Florida has no regulatory standards—despite the fact that standards are required under the Clean Water Act of 1972. EPA has 12 months to develop new and updated water quality regulations.



#### THE MANDATE

of the Clean Water Act of 1972—one of the most effective U.S. laws ever enacted and a model for clean water laws across the globe. By establishing citizens' right to enforce it, the Clean Water Act served as a powerful tool to end the culture of dumping raw sewage and industrial waste into our rivers without consideration of public health, public use, or environmental repercussions.

#### **ABOUT WATERKEEPERS**

Waterkeepers Florida is a regional entity composed of all 15 organizations in Florida to protect and restore our water resources across over 45,000 square miles of watershed, which is home to over 15 million Floridians. They facilitate collaboration and collective action on statewide issues.

#### **CLEAN WATER ACT 1972**

The Clean Water Act sought to ensure every American had access to safe, clean water, but that promise is not yet fulfilled. Florida's waters are continually plagued by harmful algae blooms. 2021 set a new record for manatee deaths due to starvation caused by poor water quality. Waters across the state are becoming impaired faster than we are able to restore them.

Using the Clean Water Act, Waterkeepers across Florida have been fighting for over 20 years to protect the waterways that are the lifeblood of our state and will continue to stand watch to ensure the new water quality standards are put into effect. Florida has 12 months to fix its water quality or EPA will do it instead.

#### ARTICLES

Two Steps to Becoming an IRS 501(c)(3) CHARITABLE ORGANIZATION AND A REGISTERED NONPROFIT IN THE STATE OF FLORIDA.

WHAT IS A 501(C)(3)? – Section 501(c)(3) is part of the US Internal Revenue Code that allows your nonprofit to be exempt from federal income tax and be considered a charitable organization—that is an organization established for specific purposes and eligible to solicit funds. There are many kinds

Nonprofit is a tax status, not a financial plan. All businesses want to earn a profit. Nonprofits retain their profits. For profit pays out dividends.

of nonprofits, but charitable and educational are the categories that fit garden clubs. Your organization will be given a Tax / Employment Identification Number (EIN) (Step 1). The EIN allows you to open a business bank account and register for the Charitable Solicitation status with the state (Step 2). Charitable organizations may apply for grants and solicit

donations, and donors may deduct that donation from their taxes, with some exceptions.

#### STEP ONE - APPLY ONLINE for IRS EIN

File online for an IRS 501(c)(3) tax-exemption number. You will receive a Letter of Designation (NOT AN EMAIL) with your new tax ID number. Save it for all eternity. It will be required at various points in the future.

#### STEP TWO - APPLY ONLINE for Sunbiz

You are registering your organization as a new corporation in the state of Florida Division of Corporations (known as www. Sunbiz.org). The online process will create your Articles of Confederation.

This enables you to solicit charitable donations. You are required to stay in compliance. Never ignore paperwork from Sunbiz.

The easy peasy directions are now on the website under Members / FAQ's. Included in the downloadable attachment are three paragraphs of great interest: (1) What Are Articles of Confederation? (2) What Are Bylaws? and (3) Charitable Solicitations Registration.

#### FFGC BYLAWS: PROPOSED AMENDMENTS

THE FOLLOWING AMENDMENTS ARE PROPOSED FOR ADOPTION AT THE APRIL 2023 FFGC CONVENTION:

ART III, IV and XI ESTABLISHING ONLINE (E) CLUB

#### ART III MEMBERS

Sec 1 Voting Membership

a. Eligibility, Admission INSERT: (4) ONLINE (E) CLUB

(4) An Online (E) Club shall have a membership of not less than ten (10). Application for membership shall be submitted to the FFGC Board of Directors through the FFGC 3rd Vice President. The application shall be accompanied by per capita dues and an alphabetical list of names, District number, mailing address and email address of all members. A majority vote of the Executive Committee shall elect the club which shall immediately be entitled to all rights and subject to all responsibilities of membership. Ratification shall follow at the next Board of Directors meeting.

#### ART IV DUES AND FEES

Sec 1 INSERT: ONLINE (e) CLUB If adopted, this will read: The annual dues of each Garden Club, Online (E) Club and each Garden Club organized............

### d. INSERT: including Online (E) Clubs

If adopted, this will read: Annual FFGC dues of member belonging to two or more Garden Clubs

including **Online** (E) **Clubs** and Garden Clubs organized......

ART XI REPRESENTATION Sec 1 b. Garden Clubs INSERT: including Online (E) Clubs

RATIONALE: Formation of Online (E) Clubs are being considered within FFGC structure. An Online Club existed many years ago, but was never formally adopted as an FFGC Club. The Bylaws listed above will include this new club designation for FFGC.

\*\*\*\*

ART IV DUES AND FEES Sec 1 e. STRIKE: e and (1) in entirety.

- e. Dues shall be payable to FFGC and shall be remitted to Headquarters by June 1. Dues of members enrolled after June 1 shall be payable immediately.
- (1) Dues shall be delinquent if not received by June 30, and a notice shall be sent. If not received by November 1, membership and all privileges shall be forfeited unless and until reinstated.

#### **INSERT:**

- e. Dues shall be payable to FFGC and shall be remitted to Headquarters by May 1. Dues of members enrolled after May 1 shall be payable immediately.
- (1) Dues shall be delinquent if not received by May 1 and a notice shall be sent. If not received by June 1, a notice shall be sent. If not received by June

30, membership and all privileges shall be forfeited unless and until reinstatement. PROVISO: Effective date – January 1, 2024.

RATIONALE: Addresses the issues: (1) Club members/Officers leaving for the summer without having paid dues for upcoming year.

- (2) Timely submission of updated information for the Book of Information which is compiled over the summer for fall distribution including current contact information for Officers and members.
- (3) NGC dues are payable June 1, and delinquent Oct 31. The current FFGC Bylaw for dues collection has a delinquent date of Nov 1 which is after the delinquent date for FFGC to pay NGC dues. Therefore, FFGC dues are delinquent and does not allow FFGC dues/membership numbers reported to NGC to be accurate.

#### PROCEDURE: The FFGC

Membership Chairman would send Dues Notice out the middle of March. With Bylaw revision, the dues would be delinquent June 1 and a notice sent. Dues not received by June 30 would result in forfeit of membership privileges. Revision proposed allows for collection of FFGC dues prior to the summer hiatus that many clubs observe.

#### ART V FINANCES

Sec 3 General Funds (after sentence – The General Fund of FFGC shall be derived.....)

#### FFGC BYLAWS: PROPOSED AMENDMENTS CONT'D

INSERT: A reserve shall be established within the General Fund to support the Penal Garden Therapy Program at the Avon Park Correctional Institution. The source of funding shall be specific donations and specific fundraisers therefore, and the use of the funds shall be exclusively for support of Avon Park Correctional Institution Penal Garden Therapy Program.

RATIONALE: The Avon Park Correctional Institutional Penal Garden Therapy program was an established FFGC project. District IX coordinated this program. This is an FFGC project and should be included in the FFGC Bylaws including all funding detail.

**ART XXI DISTRICTS** 

Sec 1 Structure STRIKE: a. INSERT: a. (1) Districts form an integral part of the overall FFGC organizational structure.

If adopted, this will read:

- a. (1) Districts form and integral part of the overall FFGC organizational structure.
- (2) Districts shall be established with boundaries defined by the FFGC Board of Directors.
- d. Transfer of a member Club from one District to another may be granted by the Board of Directors, provided such transfer is approved by the Directors of the respective Districts.

If adopted, this will read d. Transfer of a member Club from one District to another may be granted by the FFGC Board of Directors, provided such transfer was previously approved by the FFGC Directors of the respective Districts and their District Board of Directors.


INSERT: e. Bylaws for Districts are generally not required. Policies and Procedures are usually adequate. However, Articles of Incorporation, Bylaws, Policies and Procedures must conform to FFGC Bylaws. The Articles of Incorporation and/or District Bylaws must be reviewed by the FFGC Bylaws and Standing Rules Committee prior to District approval.

INSERT: Sec 4 Finances
Districts are required to obtain
individual TIN number in order
to become unique organizations
for IRS tax filing purposes. A
501 (c)(3) is not required in most
instances.

**RATIONALE**: FFGC is clarifying current Fl Sales Tax Laws that affect Districts.


