GENERAL RULES

1. This flower show conforms to the standards established by National Garden Clubs, Inc. (NGC). The *Handbook for Flower Shows*, (HB) 2017 Edition with revisions (found online and in the online version of *The National Gardener* (TNG) is the authority for all issues not covered by the Schedule, which is the **Law of the Show**.
 2. Horticulture entries are open to all amateur gardeners. Design entries are open to all garden club members. Botanical Arts entries are open to all garden club members. Youth entries are open to Junior Gardeners. Educational entries are by invitation.
 3. All entries will be received 9 April 2024, between **2:00 and 5:00 p.m.** All exhibits must be in place and all exhibitors off the floor by 5:00 p.m.
 4. Design Entry Tags are filled out in advance by the committee. Horticulture Entry Tags may be obtained from Show Chairman upon request. Exhibitor to fill out, **in pencil**, the date, common name, exhibitor's name and garden club, with assistance in plant identification from Classification. All entry tags are triplicate style (labels may be used on all copies).
 5. There must be an emphasis on FRESH plant material. No artificial plant material is permitted in any exhibit in any Division.
 6. Pre-registration required for Division I, Section H, Collections and Displays: Jan Griffin (billjangriffin@gmail.com).
Pre-registration required for Division II, Classes A-G. Designs must be ready to be placed, not constructed on site: Gina Jogan (gvjogan@panhandle.rr.com).
Pre-registration required for Division III (Youth), Sections A, B and C: Eileen Zebroski (emzebroski@aol.com).
Pre-registration required for Division V, Sections A and B to Mayfair Hydro (1Mayfair@bellsouth.net) and Section C to Bessie Morse (trophy540@runbox.com).
- Exhibitors not present by 4pm on 9 April 2024 will be considered "NO SHOWS" and their exhibits excluded from judging.**
7. The Show Chairman and the Classification Team for each division are available during judging for possible consultations. They, along with the judges and clerks, are the **only** personnel allowed on the floor during judging.
 8. All entries must be removed 12 April 2024, beginning at **2:00 p.m.** Designs **MUST** be removed on 12 April, by 4pm; however, if the design is not picked up by 3:00 p.m., the committee will move it to a safe place so that clean-up can be completed.
 9. **Judging will begin at 9:00 a.m. on 10 April 2024.** The decisions of the judges are final. Awards may be withheld if not merited. **The show will be open to the public 2p.m.-5 p.m. on 10 April, and 9 a.m.-5 p.m. on 11 April and 9 a.m.-2 p.m. on 12 April.**
 10. All **horticulture exhibits must be approved** by the Classification Committee. This committee may disqualify any entry not conforming to the schedule, or which cannot be made to conform, or any entry which is of inferior quality; however, these may be displayed for educational purposes. It is the obligation of the classification chairman to check for conformity to the schedule.
 11. Native plants may be entered provided such plants have been legally obtained and grown by the exhibitor for at least 90 days. The use of plant material classified as Federal Noxious Weeds is prohibited (aphis.usda.gov). The use of plant material on Florida's Federally Listed Plant Species as endangered or threatened is prohibited (fdacs.gov). The use of invasive plant material is prohibited (floridainvasivespecies.org).
 12. Each exhibitor is limited to one entry per class, except in the Horticulture Division and the Botanical Arts Horticulture Section.
 13. Specific rules are listed with each Division in the schedule and must be followed.

14. The Florida Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc., Garden Club of Jacksonville, and Florida Flower Show Judges will strive to assure the safety of all items after arrival and placement but are not responsible for any loss or damage to exhibits.

NGC TOP EXHIBITOR AWARDS

The NGC Standard System of Awarding is used in all Divisions.

- a. Only one (1) first place (blue) ribbon per class or subclass, scoring 90 or above;
- b. Only one (1) second place (red) ribbon per class or subclass, scoring 85 or above;
- c. Only one (1) third place (yellow) ribbon per class or subclass, scoring 80 or above;
- d. One (1) or more honorable mention (white) ribbons as merited, scoring 75 or above.

Top Exhibitor Awards listed may be offered and awarded if merited.

NOTE: In this show, stickers will be used

REQUIREMENTS FOR NGC HORTICULTURE DIVISION TOP EXHIBITOR AWARDS

1. All plant material must be cut or container grown.
2. Exhibit must be a blue-ribbon winner scoring 95 or more points. Eligible horticulture exhibits will be placed on the Awards table.
3. Exhibit **must be** correctly named with genus and specific epithet, cultivar/variety if available; common name may be added.
4. Plant material must have been grown by the individual exhibitor for the required length of time (HB p. 55).
5. There must be at least three Classes in each designated Section. There is no minimum number of exhibits required except that the total number must meet requirements for a Major Flower Show (at least 20 horticulture exhibits in all).
6. Sections/Classes eligible for each award must be listed in the schedule.
7. An award must be withheld if no exhibit is worthy and/or fails to meet specific requirements for the award.

HORTICULTURE DIVISION AWARDS

1. **Award of Horticultural Excellence (HB p. 40)** One may be offered to the highest scoring, correctly named blue ribbon winner exhibit, scoring 95 or above, in the entire Horticulture Division entered by an individual. (The winning exhibit will also have won another Top Exhibitor Award in the Horticulture Division. Only winners of Awards of Merit, Arboreal Award, Grower's Choice Awards, and Collector's Showcase, are eligible for the Award of Horticultural Excellence.) It is a rosette of green, orange, and blue ribbons.
2. **Arboreal Award (HB p.40-41)** One award may be offered and awarded to the highest scoring blue ribbon winner, scoring 95 or above, correctly named exhibit, meeting all Section requirements in Section C. It is a rosette of green ribbons.
3. **Awards of Merit (HB p.41)** Three awards may be offered and awarded to the highest scoring blue ribbon winner, scoring 95 or above, correctly named exhibit, meeting all Section requirements in Division I, Sections A, B, and G. It is a rosette of orange ribbons.

4. **Grower's Choice Awards (HB p.41)** Three awards may be offered and awarded to the highest scoring blue ribbon winner, scoring 95 or above, correctly named exhibit, meeting all section requirements in Sections D, E, and F. It is a rosette of dark green ribbons.
5. **Collector's Showcase Award – Collections and Displays (HB p.41, p.60-61)** is a Section Award and is offered and may be awarded to the highest scoring Collection or Display of five (5) or more different specimens (cut and/or container grown) exhibited in individual containers, or the appearance of being individually exhibited for their cultural perfection. Specimens must be related. Each specimen within the exhibit must score 95 points or more. **One** award is being offered in Section H. It is a rosette of brown and green ribbons.

REQUIREMENTS FOR NGC DESIGN DIVISION TOP EXHIBITOR AWARDS

1. Exhibit must be a blue-ribbon winner scoring 95 or more.
2. Schedule must designate the award's special requirements, Classes eligible, and number of exhibits required per Class.
3. There must be a minimum of three Classes with at least four exhibits in each Class (twelve designs) for each award offered.
4. No Section can be eligible for more than one Top Exhibitor Design Award.
5. All general and design award requirements must be met for each award offered. Judges must withhold the award if no exhibit meets the requirements.

DESIGN DIVISION AWARDS

1. **Award of Design Excellence (HB p. 42)** One may be offered to the highest scoring blue ribbon winner, scoring 95 or above, exhibit in the entire Design Division entered by an individual. It is a Rosette of Gold Ribbons.
2. **Award of Distinction (HB p 42)** One may be offered to the highest scoring blue ribbon winner, scoring 95 or above, entered by an individual, meeting all Section requirements in Section C. Classes 7, 8 and 9. Minimum 4 exhibits per class. It is a Rosette of Brown Ribbons
3. **Designer's Choice Award (HB p. 42)** Three awards may be offered and awarded to the highest scoring blue ribbon winner, scoring 95 or above, entered by an individual, meeting all Section requirements in Sections A, B and G, Classes 1-3, 4-6 and 19-21. Minimum 4 exhibits per class. It is a rosette of purple ribbons.
4. **Petite Award (HB p. 43)** One award may be offered and awarded to the highest scoring blue ribbon winner, scoring 95 or above, entered by an individual, meeting all Section requirements in Section D. Classes 10-12. It is a small rosette of blue and white ribbons.
5. **Table Artistry Award (HB p. 43)** One award may be offered and awarded to the highest scoring blue ribbon winner, scoring 95 or above, entered by an individual, meeting all Section requirements in Section F. Classes 16-18. Minimum 4 exhibits per class. It is a rosette of burgundy ribbons.
6. **Tricolor Award (HB p. 43)** One award may be offered and awarded to the highest scoring blue ribbon winner, scoring 95 or above, entered by an individual, meeting all Section requirements in Section E. Classes 13-15. Minimum 4 exhibits per class. It is a rosette of Red, Blue and Yellow Ribbons.

YOUTH AWARDS (HB p. 44)

One award for each Section: Horticulture, Design, and Education for a total of three may be offered to the highest scoring, blue ribbon exhibit, scoring 90 or above, no minimum number of exhibits required. It is a Rosette of Red, White and Blue Ribbons.

EDUCATIONAL AWARDS (HB p. 44)

One award may be offered to the highest scoring blue ribbon exhibit, scoring 95+, entered by one or more exhibitors. These 15 exhibits may be grouped into Sections by subject matter. It is a Rosette of Brown and White Ribbons.

BOTANICAL ARTS TOP EXHIBITOR AWARDS – SECTION AWARDS

1. **Botanical Arts Artistic Crafts Award** (HB p. 44) One may be offered and awarded to the highest scoring blue ribbon winner, scoring 95 or above, entered by an individual, meeting all Section requirements in Division V, Section A. Classes 1, 2 and 3. Minimum 4 exhibits per class. It is a rosette of navy-blue ribbons.
2. **Botanical Arts Design Award** (HB p. 44) One may be offered to the highest scoring blue ribbon winner, scoring 95 or above, entered by an individual, meeting all Section requirements in Division V, Section B. Classes 1, 2 and 3. Minimum 4 exhibits per class. It is a Rosette of Yellow and Orange Ribbons.
3. **Botanical Arts Horticulture Award** (HB p. 44) One may be offered and awarded to the highest scoring blue ribbon winner, scoring 95 or above, correctly named exhibit, meeting all Section requirements in Division V, Section C. Classes 1, 2 and 3. A minimum of 12 exhibits is required for the total number of classes. It is a rosette of light brown ribbons.

OTHER AWARDS

1. **Award of Appreciation** (HB p.45) Any number offered as determined by the Show Committee for non-judged exhibits. A Rosette of orchid ribbons.

DIVISION I – HORTICULTURE
“DIGGING IT”

HORTICULTURE RULES (HB Chapter 6 and *Handbook for Judging and Exhibiting*)

1. All horticulture specimens must be **fresh plant materials grown by the exhibitor.**
2. All classes are open to amateur gardeners.
3. All entries must be checked by the Classification Committee and must **conform to the schedule** regulations. All entries are to be labeled by genus and specific epithet and/or variety or patented/trademarked names. Common names may also be given.
4. Exhibitor may enter more than one specimen per class or subclass if each entry is a different genus, specific epithet, cultivar, variety, type, size, or color.
5. Classification Chairman has the authority to subdivide classes by color, type, cultivar, etc., as necessary. Judges do not subdivide.
6. Clear, colorless containers for fresh cut plant materials provided by exhibitor. Containers should be free of any labels or imprinted design. Foam or paper plates for fruits, nuts, and vegetables (Section I) will be provided by the committee.
7. There should be no foliage below the water line on cut specimens except *Gladiolus*.
8. Wedging materials, if needed, will be furnished by the committee. No anchoring is allowed.
9. No oiling, dressing of foliage, or wiring, props, sticks, ties, etc., on cut specimens or container-grown specimens are allowed unless the plant is actively growing on the support. (If the plant naturally vines, a trellis is permitted.) No accessories are allowed in containers.
10. Plants with height or width exceeding 30” may be refused by classification; alternative placement may be allowed if space is available. These specimens will not be judged.
11. Cut flowers or cut decorative foliage should be one stem unless otherwise indicated in the schedule.
12. Specific sections and classes in horticulture may have restrictions for entering. Please check the schedule.
13. Reference for horticulture entries will be the *Southern Living Garden Book*.
14. Plants, cut or container-grown, must have been in the possession of the exhibitor 90 days, combinations growing together for 6 weeks, arboreal for 6 months, annuals to maturity. (HB p. 55). **No double potting.**
15. **NO OVERSIZED** horticulture is permitted. Specimens that do not conform to schedule regulations will be accepted for display for the edification of the public but will not be judged.
16. Containers for foliage and flowering plants, preferably of clay or black plastic, **MAY NOT EXCEED 12”** in diameter or height. Hanging Baskets may not exceed 18” in diameter or height. The weight limit for all containers is 20 lbs.
17. Hydroponically grown exhibits will not be accepted.

All horticulture specimens will be received 9 April 2024 from 2:00 to 5:00 p.m.

All entries must be on the classification table by 4:45 PM.

NO LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED.

DESIGN RULES

1. All entries **MUST BE THE WORK OF ONE EXHIBITOR** and must be verified for conformance by the Design Conformance Committee **BEFORE** the exhibitor leaves the floor.
2. Plant material need not be grown by the exhibitor.
3. Fresh plant material may not ever be treated in any manner. Dried plant material may be treated.
4. If Designer is unable to fulfill her/his assignment, it is Designer's responsibility to find a replacement.
5. Plant material permitted and prohibited. (HB p. 80-81)
6. Designer is on her/his honor that the design being entered has not been previously entered or previously judged in an NGC show.
7. Scale of Points on page 15 of this schedule.
8. **RESERVATIONS** are necessary for all design classes.
9. Every attempt should be made to correctly identify plant material with botanically correct name and listed on a lined 3” x 5” index card provided by the exhibitor. Classification will assist with naming of plant material upon request. Judges will write comments for all entries (except blue ribbon winners) on the back of the plant material card.
10. The Designer has the freedom to choose Traditional or Creative Style with any Design listed unless restricted by the Schedule.
11. Frame of Reference is the space within which the design must fit and be proportionate; do not confuse it with the Staging dimensions.
12. **ONLY** exhibitors and show committee will be allowed in the show area at this time
13. Design classes consist of four (4) entries each.
14. Exhibitor is limited to one (1) entry per class but may enter as many classes as desired.
15. Entry cards will be filled out and placed by the Design Reservation Chairman.
16. Exhibitors are expected to freshen their exhibits as necessary throughout the show.
17. If Designer cannot place design on show day, someone else may place a completed design (but not change design), using a photo as a guide.
18. All designs must contain some plant material.
19. Contrived floral forms of recognizable plant material are permitted.
20. Landscapes or scenes are not permitted.
21. Blue or 90+ ribbon winner’s entry card **MUST BE SIGNED BY AN ACCREDITED JUDGE**. Other placed entries need not be signed. Entries **NOT PLACED MUST BE INITIALED** to prove they have been seen by the judging panel.
22. The decision of the judges shall be final. Top Exhibitor Awards will be determined by the panel of judges who judge in that section. Awards may be withheld if not merited.
23. When a **staging panel** is required in the schedule, it **MUST** be provided by the designer and meet specifications as listed.

"ARRANGED TO PERFECTION"

Section A: "Education": *Eligible for Designer's Choice Award* (HB p. 42)

It is the primary mission of FFGC to educate our members, including our youth, and the public in the areas of horticulture, design, caring for the environment, conservation, gardening, and landscape design through our numerous educational opportunities, workshops, programs, presentations, and projects.

Class 1: Floral Design Studies: "Learning the Basics", a free-standing Traditional Line, Line-Mass or Mass design (HB p. 71) staged on a white wooden column/pedestal 40" tall and 14" square.

Class 2: Workshops: "Useful Tools in my Workbasket"—A Still Life Design (HB p.76) A traditional or creative non-abstract grouping of functional and realistic objects and plant material with a theme. Design staged on one-half of a 6' long table that is 29" tall. Frame of Reference is 30"Wx24"Dx 40"H. Designer to provide staging panel and matching underlay.

Class 3: Nature Study: "Outdoors": A design staged on one-half of a 6' long table that is 29" tall. Frame of Reference is 30"Wx24"Dx 40"H. Designer to provide staging panel and matching underlay.

Section B: "The Environment": *Eligible for Designer's Choice Award* (HB p. 42)

Emphasis on and commitment to environmental concerns can be discovered in our Position Papers.

Class 4: Water: "The Springs"—An Underwater Design (HB. p.79) staged in a Frame of Reference that is 24" W x 24"D x 36"H staged on a black cloth covered 29" tall table. Staging panel with underlay is required. This is a creative design having some or all plant material and other optional component(s) submerged in water. Plant material and other components under water must contribute to the overall design and are selected for their lasting quality.

Class 5: Land: Roadside Beautification: "Paths of Sunshine": A Panel Design using contrived floral forms in a Frame of Reference that is 30"W x 24"D x 36"H, on a black cloth covered 29" tall table; Staging panel and underlay required. This design uses structural panel/s as an integral part of the design.

Class 6: Community Gardens: “Beautifying our community”: A Multi-rhythmic design (HB p. 75) staged in a Frame of Reference that is 36” W x 24” D x 36” H on a black cloth covered 29” tall table. This is a creative design with emphasis on two or more rhythms in the design with one rhythm dominating. Lines may go in any direction, be continuous, interrupted and/or crossed.

Section C: “The Community”. *Eligible for Award of Distinction* (HB p. 42)

Beautifying and preserving our community was one of the foundations of our organization.

Class 7: Recycling: “The 4 Rs”: An Assemblage Design (HB p. 77-78) staged on a small column Pedestal that is 40” tall and 14” square. This is a three-dimensional abstract design, consisting of “found” unrelated objects and plant material.

Class 8: “Preserving Woodland Habitats”: A design (to be selected by designer) staged in a Frame of Reference that is 24”W x 24”D x 36”H, on a black cloth covered 29” tall table; Staging panel and underlay required.

Class 9: National Projects: “Natural Disasters Relief”: A design (type to be selected by designer) staged in a Frame of Reference that is 24”W x 24”D x 36”H, on a black cloth covered 29” tall table; Staging panel and underlay required.

Section D: Youth “Growing our Own”. *Eligible for Petite Award* (HB p. 43)

Our involvement in youth programs and projects has long been a focus of our clubs and circles. Untold volunteer hours have been given working with children.

Class 10: Our Youth Gardeners: “Sprouts” A 12” Traditional Design-designer may choose from Traditional Line, Line-Mass or Mass (HB p. 70).

Each design is based on a single ‘set pattern’ of geometric forms with plant material used in a naturalistic manner, radiating from one point. Forms and colors are integrated. Design staged at eye level in a Frame of Reference that is 14”H x 14”Wx14”D. A staging panel (14”x14”) and underlay (14”x14”) are required. Please state which Traditional Design is being exhibited.

Class 11: Wekiva Youth Camp: “Campers today...”: A Creative Design staged at eye level in a grey-tinted acrylic shadowbox section measuring 10” H x 10” W x 5” D. Nothing may be adhered to shadowbox. Staging panel and underlay are optional

Class 12: S.E.E.K.: “Environmental Leaders of Tomorrow” an abstract design (HB p. 72) staged at eye level in a 7”Hx 7”W x 5” D section of a gray-tinted acrylic shadowbox Nothing may be adhered to the shadowbox. Staging panel and underlay are optional. Abstract designs share the same characteristics with all other creative designs but go a step farther. All components need not be abstracted however the design must have a dominance of abstraction.

Section E. “Horticulture”: *Eligible for Tricolor Award* (HB p. 43)

The art and science of horticulture allows us to grow, show and share the plants, trees, shrubs, fruits and vegetables we coax from the soil.

Class 13: Grow: “Reaching New Heights”: A Creative Line Design (HB p.74) A creative design where the line is dominant with a minimum of plant material and other optional components. Staged in a Frame of Reference that is 24”W x 24”D x 36”H, on a black cloth covered 29” tall table; Staging panel and underlay required.

Class 14: Show: “Entries and Exhibits”: A Grouped Mass Design (HB p. 78) A creative mass design of only plant material with radial placement emanating from one point of emergence. Like material is grouped and placed next to other different grouped like material. Staged in a Frame of Reference that is 30”W x 24”D x 36”H, on a black cloth covered 29” tall table; Staging panel and underlay required.

Class 15: Share: “Generous Gardeners”-A design staged in a Frame of Reference that is 24”W x 24”D x 36”H, on a black cloth covered 29” tall table; Staging panel and underlay required.

Section F: “Design”. *Eligible for Table Artistry Award* (HB p. 43)

The use of fresh plant material as an art medium is unique to our floral design expression.

Class 16: Festivals: “Mother’s Day at EPCOT”: A Tray for One (HB p.76) staged in a pie-shaped section of a 60” round table draped in black cloth. Tray, provided by designer, may not exceed 12”x18”.

Class 17: Competition: “Blue Ribbon Winner”: An Exhibition Table (HB p. 76) staged on and incorporating a small frame pedestal that is white, wooden, measuring 38” tall and 11” wide on all sides. This design is created artistically to suggest the service of food with no requirements as to the type or number of table appointments. Plant material must be used as needed for overall design.

Class 18: Floral Arrangement Calendar: “Calendar Girls”: A functional table for four staged on a 60” round table (HB p. 76) Table planned and set for actual service of food. Designer to provide table covering/s to the floor (if using underlay with over-draping, the over-drape has unlimited drop).

Section G: “Our Organization and Structure”. *Eligible for Designer’s Choice Award* (HB p. 42)

For 100 years FFGC has evolved in organization and structure but has remained committed to the stated mission.

Class 19: Past/Former State Presidents: “Leadership Themes”: A Design staged on a round high-boy table draped in black measuring 43”Hx31”diameter. Designer to state the president’s theme being interpreted on his/her entry card.

(List of previous themes is available at FFGC.org/About Us/History)

Class 20: Districts: “Connections”: A Design staged on four small open sided pedestals with varying heights from 38” H. Designer may feature his/her district color or that of another district: (D-I YG, D-II G, D-III BG, D-IV B, D-V BV, D-VI V, D-VII RV, D-VIII R, D-IX RO, D-X O, D-XI YO, D-XII Y)

Class 21: Membership: “Building Blocks”: A Construction Design (HB p. 74) staged on a round high-boy table draped in black measuring 43”Hx31”diameter. This is a creative design with strong architectural characteristics using geometric form or forms combined into a single three-dimensional unit.

DIVISION III—YOUTH (HB. 88)

“GROWING TOGETHER”

Eligible for Youth Top Exhibitor Award (HB p.44)

Youth Rules

1. Age groups are defined as follows: Juniors (Pre-school through age 7 or elementary school grades. Intermediates (Age 8-12 or middle school grades. High school (Age 13-18 or junior/senior high school grades.
2. All designs must be created by the exhibitor.
3. All horticulture must be grown by the exhibitor, though plants could be part of a family garden or yard.
4. Time of possession: Container-grown plants must have been in the possession of the youth exhibitor for a minimum of 60 days. Combination plantings must have been grown together for at least 3 weeks.

Youth exhibits are evaluated using adult design, horticulture, and educational exhibits Scales of Points (HB Chapter 14). Top Exhibitor Awards must score 90+.

Section A: Horticulture “Can You Dig It?” Eligible for the Junior Award. Staged on a 60” round table/s.

Class 1: Juniors

Section B: Design “Yes, I Can”. A Design staged on a 6’ x 30” banquet table (29” tall) draped in black. Design may use a Frame of reference of 24”Hx 24”d x24”H

Class 1: Intermediates

Section C: Educational Displays “Show Me How”. An Educational Exhibit that teaches/shows how to do something related to NGC objectives, planting, propagation, landscape, etc. Must occupy a minimum of 6 square feet of surface area and may be created by more than one youth. Staged on 8’ long banquet tables draped in black in a Frame of Reference 24” W x 24” D x 36”H. Exhibitor is to use a 36H”x24”W staging panel.

Class 1: High Schoolers

DIVISION IV—EDUCATION (HB Chapter 8)
“LIFE-LONG LEARNERS” Eligible for the Educational Award (HB p. 43)
RULES (HB p. 85-86)

1. Each exhibit must occupy a minimum of 18 square feet of surface area (horizontal, vertical, or combination). Exhibit may not drape components over front of table nor have plants sitting on floor in front of table.
2. Exhibits may be the work of more than 1 person or organization unless a Student Judge or an Accredited Judge is seeking exhibiting credit for preparing an educational exhibit.
3. Some plant material is required.
4. Staging: one half of an 8” long x 29” tall x30” deep banquet table draped in black. These will be placed on the stage in the auditorium.
5. Advanced registration required: Tina Tuttle (ttuttle1954@gmail.com)
6. All exhibits will be competitive. Scale of points (HB p. 130)

“SOMETHING FOR EVERYONE”

BOTANICAL ARTS GENERAL RULES

1. All Botanical Arts Horticulture and Artistic Crafts exhibits must contain some plant material.
2. No artificial plant material is permitted in any exhibit.
3. The Scales of Points for judging Botanical Arts Horticulture, Design, and Artistic Crafts are listed in Chapters 11 and 14 of the *Handbook for Flower Shows*.

4. All types of accessories are permitted in container-grown miniature gardens (HB p. 92).
5. Emphasis in container-grown miniature garden is not necessarily on plant material, but some live plant material/s must be included.
6. Container-grown miniature garden specimens must be correctly and clearly labeled with the current scientific designation and in a manner to easily identify the specimen's location, either with a single chart or individual placards.
7. Container-grown specimens must have been grown by exhibitor for at least 6 weeks.

BOTANICAL ARTS HORTICULTURE OTHER THAN GARDENS RULES (HB p. 91-92)

1. All specimens must be preserved by the exhibitor. Purchased specimens are prohibited. All entries must be checked by the Classification Committee and conform to the schedule regulations. All entries are to be labeled by genus and specific epithet and/or variety or patented/trademarked names.
2. May use hairspray or products such as *Super Surface Sealer* to prevent shattering of fragile seed heads, etc. No other embellishments permitted.
3. Judged by **Horticulture Scale of Points** (schedule p. 5).

RULES FOR ARTISTIC CRAFTS (HB pp. 94-95)

1. **Reservations must be made for entries in Botanical Arts Artistic Crafts.** Pre-register with Mayfair Hydro (1mayfair@bellsouth.net)
2. Exhibit must contain some fresh and/or dried plant material. Only dried material may be treated.
3. A 3"x5" index card, provided by exhibitor, listing plant material with both botanical and common names must be included

Section A: Artistic Crafts “Talent on Display”. *Eligible for BA Artistic Crafts Award* (HB p. 44)

- Class 1: “Convention Wardrobe”:** A Decorated Hat, provided by the exhibitor, staged on a 15” white wig stand provided by the committee. The hat must be wearable and have some fresh and/or dried plant material. Wig stand to be obtained at the January 2024 FFGC Board of Directors’ Meeting.

Section B: Botanical Design “Outside the Box”. *Eligible for BA Design Award* (HB p. 44)

- Class 1: A Collage “Any Which Way but Loose”** using 20” x 24” canvas on easel, both provided by committee (HB p. 93). Canvas obtained at January 2024 Board of Directors’ Meeting.
- Class 2: Small Hanging Design:** (HB p. 93) ”The Winds of Change”: Using a gold tone 12” hanging hook. Hooks may be obtained at the January 2024 FFGC Board of Directors meeting.
- Class 3: Exploration:** “The Next 100 Years!” (HB p. 94) Staged on a 40”W x 30”D section of a table, draped in black, Designer to provide optional staging panel...height determined by designer, but not to exceed 48”.

Section C: Botanical Horticulture “Beyond the Container”. *Eligible for the BA Horticulture Award* (HB p. 44). Scales of Points for Judging Horticulture found on page 9.

- Class 1. Dried and Preserved Specimens** (HB p. 91-92)
- Class 2: Container-Grown Miniature Gardens** (HB p. 92) staged on a section of an 8’ long banquet table that is 30” deep. A miniature landscape/scene such as a Fairy Garden, Diorama, etc. All types of accessories permitted. Must contain a minimum of three botanically different plants. To be exhibited, the plants must have been grown together in the container for a minimum of six weeks.
- Class 3: Manipulated Plants** (HB p. 91-93) staged on a section of an 8’long banquet table that is 30” deep. A single plant whose natural growth has been altered by the exhibitor or someone other than the exhibitor. The entry must have been grown by the exhibitor for at least six months.

DIVISION VI- OTHER (HB p.135,138)

Section A: Commercial Vendors—The Garden Club of Jacksonville to choose and coordinate sale of spaces outside in the courtyard or in front of the building.

Section B: Plant Vendors—The Garden Club of Jacksonville to choose and coordinate sale of spaces to vendors outside in the courtyard or in front of the building.
