## **DISTRICT III NEWS**

Because of the 2020-21 pandemic, all clubs in the District are not reporting at this time, however, all active clubs will be included in future quarterly District III News.

### **Live Oak Garden Club, Shirley Reaves, President**

District III Spring Meeting, hosted by Live Oak Garden Club May 13, "Walking the Green Path", featured table centerpieces of shoes filled with flowers. Emphasis was on conservation and the need to recycle, reuse, and support clean energy, protect our waters and the environment. The matching fund drive netted \$1,600 to help Hearthstone Gardens complete the Japanese Garden, partially funded by a \$1,000 Plant America grant. A beautiful bridge over a Koi pond and walking paths were constructed, along with new shrubs. Monthly workshops are held in the garden such as seeding, propagation, lawn care and pine needle basket-making, thanks to member Judith Mundy, director of the gardens.

The 2020-21 year began with 57 paid members in spite of losing three faithful members who passed away in 2020. Current membership stands at 63, an increase of six members in spite of the pandemic! The Club completed an ambitious project to landscape the front of our building. All old shrubs were removed and new landscaping installed, including irrigation, mulch and sod. Funds received for participation in the 2018 FFGC Convention helped purchase the plants and materials needed to complete the project.

During the months of September and October 2020, a series of mini-meetings featuring plant exchange and floral design demonstration were held but limited to 12 members with masks, social distancing and sanitizing observed. The mini-meetings along with monthly newsletters kept members involved. November's meeting was a board and general membership meeting to vote on revised by-laws and budget. In December, the clubhouse, inside and outside, was decorated for Christmas. Members collected non-perishable food to help fill the pantries of the ARC group homes in the community. In February, members donated over 100 valentines and delivered the cards to nursing home residents along with candy and balloons. The same month, member Irene McCall's 100th birthday was celebrated, giving her a bouquet of yellow roses and many, many cards.

The first general meeting was held March 2021 to plan the Spring Bazaar for April and hosting the District III FFGC meeting in May. All board members agreed to extend their terms for another year to accomplish and complete projects suspended due to the pandemic. The April meeting featured a container garden demonstration.

### **Tallahassee Garden Club**

The Monthly meetings, beginning September 2020 and continuing monthly throughout the year, were held in person and via Zoom, while practicing social distancing, mask wearing and sanitization. The historic Rutgers House, the Club headquarters, was decorated for Christmas with live greenery and decorations and open for viewing by members only. The monthly plant exchange and horticulture programs, a very popular and well-attended event featuring a variety and large number of plants, were suspended subject to CDC guidelines on gathering size.

The Spring General Membership meeting was held in March with election of new officers for 2021-23, and a planned May "swearing in" ceremony.

Prior to the pandemic 'lock down', the Third Live Oak Trail was updated by members of the Club. As it turned out, the self-driving tour of featured live oak trees became a safe and scenic driving trip within the community, a diversion from being home-bound because of the pandemic.

The Tallahassee Garden Club creates "The Third Live Oak Trail". The Tallahassee Garden Club has a long history beginning in 1926, of making "A more beautiful Tallahassee". In 2020, an effort began to create the "Third Live Oak Trail", a listing of Live Oak trees, nominated by members of the community, and drawing from the earlier Trail listings. Tallahassee is a Tree City and is graced with an urban canopy of which the Live Oak tree is beloved.

The first Live Oak Trail was a listing with locations of the heritage and specimen Live Oak trees dated 1940 and repeated in 1941. It wasn't until the Tallahassee Garden Club in 2020 began the update and expansion on previous material, that the "Third Live Oak Trail" was created. The information is available for the community's use, as well as visitor use, and can be found online at [tallahasseeclub.com/the-third-live-oak-trail/](http://tallahasseeclub.com/the-third-live-oak-trail/). The site includes an interactive map, YouTube video, links to Live Oak facts and resources, and a printable Live Oak Trail map.

### **Garden Club of Green Cove Springs, Connie Gladding, President**



Our expert IT member Casie Garrett set up the QR code so the user can find coordinated numerical labels of all the native and Florida friendly plants in Lily Park to birds-eye photos and a touring video. Clicking on the plant number will take you to a photo and more information from an additional source such as UF/IFAS Gardening Solutions. The QR sign will give members of the community access to information that will help them make better choices for their own Florida yards quickly and easily. Additional great news we received, April 2, 2021. Gatto Tires and Auto Service sent us a check for \$2,374, the ENTIRE cost of a hurricane proof illuminated flagpole. FFGC awarded Garden Club by the Sea a check in the amount of \$500, in matching grant funds for the Lily Park Revitalization. CONGRATULATIONS!

Wow! What a year this has been. Covid 19 swooped in creating a Pandemic not seen since 1918. Covid 19 knocked us down, for a minute, but like the great Muhammad Ali, District VII recovered quickly to do what we do best, help our community.

District VII rallied behind our local government by sewing masks and delivering food to the needy. Since we could not visit our members and friends in residential facilities, small floral containers were created by club members, taken to the facilities and left at the outside entrance for staff to distribute to residents.

As usual, District VII clubs continue to support our youth by contributing scholarships for S.E.E.K., Wekiva Youth Camp, School Programs, State Universities and Colleges.

District VII held our District Meeting on May 7, 2021 in Apopka. We also anticipate several club Flower shows: Lake County Council Garden Clubs Flower Show, and District VII & Judges Council Flower Show are coming soon.

Lastly, it has been my pleasure and honor to serve as District VII Director, 2019-2021, and under the auspices of FFGC President, Al Latina.

### **Bloom and Grow Society Garden Club**, *Jeanne Yazinski, President*

On April 10, 2021, in conjunction with our Monarch Project, we presented a documentary film, "Flight of the Butterflies", about the migration of the Monarch butterfly. The two screenings were at 3 pm and 5 pm with Covid 19 protocols in place. The ticket sale proceeds went toward the "Bloom & Grow Monarch Project".

On April 17, 2021 we participated in the city of Winter Garden's "Arts in April" event by creating their popular "Chalkin' It Up" chalk art contest in front of city hall on Plant Street in downtown Winter Garden. The contest normally takes place during our annual "Spring Fever in the Garden" festival but was cancelled this year due to the pandemic. Artists competed for prizes as our talented artists created flower themed sidewalk art.

Our Bloom & Grow Monarch Project, is involved in advocating the protection of the Monarch butterfly. While not officially endangered, their migration has been threatened due to loss of habitat and the milkweed which they need to breed. We contacted nurseries in our area. They put together 10 plants that help the monarchs on their journey south, which included 3 varieties of milkweed (two native & one tropical) and two types of nectar plants. We had 50 of these sets of Monarch Waystation plants for sale. We took preorders and offered them for pickup in downtown Winter Garden.

During the month of April, 2021, the "Crooked Can Brewery and Marketplace" in downtown Winter Garden offered "Monarch Beer" to benefit our Monarch Project. A portion of the cost of each glass of "Monarch Beer" sold went to our Bloom & Grow Garden Society Garden Club.

On April 30, 2021 we held our annual workday at Tucker Ranch. Last year we planted "1000 Trees for 1000 Years." On Friday April 30, we celebrated National Arbor Day by gathering a group of members and volunteers to maintain the 1000 bald cypress trees we planted. We weeded around the base of the trees to ensure they had room to grow for 1000 years! We also planted an additional ceremonial Bald Cypress (*Taxodium distichum*) to mark National Arbor Day 2021 and honor our 2019-2020 Bloom & Grow President, *Brenda Knowles*.

### **Camellia Garden Club**, *Sue Roberts, President*

Our Garden Club donated two Camellia bushes to the city of Tavares for planting at the town cemetery. We dedicated the two bushes for Arbor Day 2021. Pictured here are club members surrounding one of the camellia bushes at the dedication ceremony.



Camellia GC also gifted the town of Eustis two Florida Maple trees which were planted at the Eustis Public Library. These trees are in honor of one of our founding members, Ruth Squire who celebrated her 102nd birthday. Our dedication ceremony was held on April 6.

## **Gold Star Families Memorial Marker**

Florida's 5th "Gold Star Families Memorial"

Following WWII, National Garden Clubs, Inc. wanted to honor, in a visible way, the men and women returning home as well as those who served on the home front. One of their several ways to do that was in the creation of a Blue Star Marker program, now a mere 75 years ago. The Blue Star Memorial program thrived, and over three thousand markers have now been placed across our country on highways, in gardens, cemeteries and other appropriate locations. Perhaps your Garden Club has placed such a marker in your community and you are familiar with its history. Then in recent years, NGC, Inc., had another dream which involved partnering with the Gold Star Families national organization, to recognize and honor these special families.

## Gold Star Families Memorial Marker (cont'd)

What is a Gold Star family and why do Garden Clubs across our nation honor them with the Gold Star Families Memorial? Many of you already know and some of you may even be Gold Star family. A Gold Star family is a family who has suffered the devastating loss of their family member as a result of military service. Parents experiencing the death of a son or daughter, a wife losing a husband. or now days, a husband losing a wife. No coincidence, the writer of this article is a Gold Star kid, because her father was killed on active duty when she was 13. It made her who she is today and ignites within her a passion for serving our country's veterans, living or not, and the survivors they cherished.

District IV, in Northeast Florida, is made up of 7 counties, 14 clubs and 49 circles. During the Spring of 2020, just before our lives were turned upside down with Covid, a member of the Fleming Island Garden Club, approached the District IV Director, Joy Elrod, asking if she would consider the idea of getting all the clubs together to place a Gold Star Families Memorial somewhere in the District? The Gold Star Families Memorial program was nationally approved in May of 2015, and there are thousands of military families living in our seven-county area. And, could it possibly be placed on the grounds of the future Cecil Field POW\*MIA Memorial and Museum in Duval County? Knowing the future Museum is a major undertaking and only in the early stages of development, the Fleming Island member had a connection with the future National Memorial and thought they too might consider the idea worthy.

Joy was on board immediately and mentioned an up-coming meeting of all the District's club presidents in St. Augustine. The idea was presented there. Those in attendance voted unanimously in favor, and the idea of finding a location for a Gold Star Families Memorial was off and running. It took a while, but the steering committee for the future POW\*MIA Memorial and Museum in Duval County eventually approved the Gold Star. They also stated they would be interested in creating something even grander for what would be only the 5th Gold Star Families Memorial in all of Florida and the only memorial in this area, dedicated to Gold Star families.

The final decision was made to place the Gold Star Families Memorial on the sacred grounds of the restored and historic Chapel of the High-Speed Pass, which is currently the hub of the future, Washington D.C. level, Memorial. Joy suggested allocating District funds for the Memorial itself, and the newly formed District IV Gold Star committee, consisting of Joy Elrod, Kalia Baillene, Jackie Host and Lynn Vernon were tasked with raising additional funds to complete the growing project. Not so simple in 2020, in a Covid driven state where "fund-raising" events could not and would not take place. Yes, the funds to complete this very large project were eventually raised, however mostly by the POW\*MIA committee members themselves.

So here we are in early 2021 with the date for the completion and dedication of the Gold Star Families Memorial garden being Feb. 27th. Many people from various veteran oriented groups have come together to complete and honor current and future Gold Star families who will someday visit here. A custom-made concrete bench has been donated and created with the Gold Star emblem embedded in the concrete itself, a flag pole was donated to fly the Gold Star flag, lighting for the flag pole and the Marker had to be created, extensive new irrigation, a sizeable concrete walkway to approach the Gold Star Memorial, entirely new landscaping from dirt to delightful, as well as an area for Memorial bricks to be purchased and placed for only Gold Star families. It was a monumental task, but one laden with love and appreciation.

To add to the uniqueness of this Gold Star Families Memorial, dedication day will coincide with a reunion commemorating the 30th anniversary of Desert Storm and Desert Shield and also the dedication of an Air Crew Memorial remembering local Navy personnel who died during the Gulf Wars era.

We sincerely thank the Executive Director of the POW\*MIA Memorial & Museum, District IV club and committee members, and donors who have come together to create a very special place for Gold Star Families, and, as garden club members of Northeast Florida, it has been a very real privilege to honor all Gold Star families in this way.

## Orphaned Blue Star Memorial Markers



Since the NGC initiated the Blue Star Memorial Program after the end of World War II there have been over two hundred Blue Star Memorial markers dedicated in Florida. Unfortunately, of this number there are about thirty Blue Star Memorial markers where the sponsoring garden club is no longer affiliated with the FFGC or the club no longer exists. We refer to these markers as "orphans".

The orphaned markers are not in all cases without benefactors. In some instances the original garden club is still active and remains committed to caring for the marker. In a few cases a city or county government, a historical society, or another non-garden club entity has taken on the responsibility to ensure that the orphaned marker visibly remains a fitting tribute to our veterans. And, there are occasions where other FFGC garden clubs have stepped in and "adopted" the orphaned marker. The Temple Terrace Garden Club deserves special mention in that, aside from the marker they ordered and dedicated themselves in 2004, the club has adopted and refurbished two additional orphaned Blue Star Memorial markers in the Tampa area. And, just last year the Miami Beach Garden Club adopted and refurbished one of Florida's earliest markers originally dedicated over sixty-five years ago along US 1 in Miami. The following photos show the before and after views of this marker on highway US- 1 in Miami.



At present there are still approximately a dozen Blue Star Memorial markers across the state which have been orphaned and have not been adopted, such as the one pictured below.



Virtually all of these orphaned, un-adopted markers are in need of restoration after typically decades of exposure to the elements. Each of them includes the NGC named usually within the medallion on top, and most also name the FFGC. As such, when the markers no longer give a proper homage to our veterans they do not reflect well on our organization. Therefore, garden clubs and Districts are encouraged to consider adoption of an orphaned Blue Star Memorial marker. Financial assistance may be available via the FFGC's Matching Grants Program. 
Well, if you missed the 2021 convention, last month at the Hilton Daytona Beach Oceanfront Resort, you missed having fun, being informed, and being with friends.

## **Get the Planting Party Started**

All it takes is a donor and a little desire to get the planting party started! And that's precisely what happened this winter as part of a restorative dune planting project initiated by The Ocean Ridge Garden Club (ORGC).

In the 2000s, a good thing happened for the Town of Ocean Ridge. A small parcel of oceanfront property was gifted from a private homeowner. If caring for it was not giving thanks enough, the subsequent advancements from local gardening enthusiasts have been another giant leap forward in reversing land mismanagement and paying it forward to nature – as nature intended.

Jerry Lower, the recipient of The Florida Federation of Garden Club's 2013 Earth Steward Award for his work in launching a native plant demonstration plot, is a native plant enthusiast and publisher of The Coastal Star newspaper. His contributions include removing nonnative invasive plants, escaped from well-intentioned but unwitting nearby exotic landscapes, and populating this valuable real estate with biodiverse natives. Communities of native plants that evolved in the Florida dune ecosystem create habitat that is stronger, more resilient to erosion and sea level rise, and also support the native wildlife that helped create the native dune ecosystem in the first place.

From Covid-19 to climate change, we know that earnest individual action is more necessary than ever before. The more recent approval from Allison Adams, Master Gardener and Chair of ORGC's Beautification & Conservation Committee, enabled a collaborative effort in mobilizing more regional conservation on the ground. Plant donor, Rita Ginsky, a longstanding member of ORGC, along with Kimberlee Pompeo, FFGC's District X PAT Vice-Chair of the Barrier Islands and Past President of ORGC, and George Gann, Founder of The Institute for Regional Conservation and an FFGC Affiliate, continued in this gardening crusade by first, assessing placement of new native species based on salt, sun and wind tolerance and further evaluation for long-range success of these turf alternatives.

George Gann has 35 years of experience in coastal restoration and is Chair Emeritus and International Policy Lead for the Society for Ecological Restoration, one of the Global Partners in the United Nations 2021-2030 Decade on Ecosystem Restoration. George is also lead author of the 2019 International Principles and Standards for the Practice of Ecological Restoration, which is cited as a key document in the official United Nations' Decade strategy.

In the careful positioning, ORGC members installed a pairing of host larvae and nectar larvae native plants preferred by butterflies. Julia Walker, a longstanding member of ORGC and Beautification & Conservation participant, best explained the goal of this season's project as a showcase for enduring conservation that can be replicated along Ocean Ridge's coastal front. ORGC hopes to increase awareness among private beachfront owners through the visual beauty of this landscape and, in its viability, demonstrate the benefits of caring for and restoring these areas. These efforts represent a dual function in the first line of defense from rising sea levels while propagating necessary plant biodiversity -all in hopes of avoiding the extinction of native species.

As an example, the existing ground cover led by Allison Adams and planted by members of ORGC in and amongst an earlier phase of young saw palmetto, is dune sunflower. The bright yellow daisy-like flowers will dazzle onlookers and native bees alike, while the sprawling root system continues to help in the stabilization of shifting sand. Once established, little care is needed and the seeds provide food for wildlife. A short-lived perennial and equally nomadic, when it thins, the plant can be cut back and supplemented with other natives.

Who said natural landscapes are less pretty?



The property is located in Palm Beach County on the east side of Old Ocean Blvd between Tropical Drive and Douglas Drive and marked by public access signage by the Town of Ocean Ridge. Pedestrians and bicyclers are invited to visit and use the beach path while appreciating the project's work. The SEEK 2021 program will not be held at the University of Florida Gainesville campus. Due to COVID-19, the University decided to cancel all "in-person" summer programs. However, the Committee determined we could still have the in-person conference and follow the CDC Guidelines. With the help of a former SEEK student and FFGC Scholarship winner, Quinn Zackarias, (a grad student leaving this fall for Yale to work on his PhD), we are putting together a great educational program.

For those who are unfamiliar with the FFGC SEEK Program, it is an educational conference for students finishing the 9th grade to students starting the 12th grade. Students are encouraged to attend all three years. Our garden clubs across the state contact science teachers at local high schools to find students interested in the environment. FFGC wants to encourage these students to be our future environmental advocates. FFGC members can retrieve all the flyers and registration information from our FFGC.org website. The conference will be limited to approximately 25 to 30 students due to CDC Guidelines.

Our state is experiencing a vast population growth with no slowdown in the near future. By helping educate our young and future Floridians as well as our members, we will continue to have advocates interested in the conservation of Florida.

Together we will make a difference!

### Invite Birds for Diversity in the Garden

Each morning I am enthralled by the antics of various birds as I walk around the garden sipping my morning cup of coffee. Ruby-throated hummingbirds indulge in the offerings of the red pentas at the edge of the herbaceous border. House finches and cardinals vie for perches on the sunflower feeder. Nuthatches and tufted titmice scurry up and down among branches of the mixed shrub border looking for food. Mourning doves glide in for a landing on the sand path. Brown thrashers scratch in the mulch, and mockingbirds wait for a turn at the fig tree. Carolina wrens flit in and out among the cypress knees searching for bugs and spiders. A woodpecker's drumming resonates through the morning air as it investigates a pine snag. My world is alive with a cacophony of sounds and fluttering's of wings.

How did I get to be this lucky? What special things have I done to orchestrate this daily extravaganza? I remember the time when I could not distinguish between a tufted titmouse and a chickadee. Birds were birds and I took little notice of them. Somewhere along the way my awareness increased, and I began to buy books to identify them. My interest was piqued, and I began to learn more about their habits and requirements. Soon I found myself so intrigued that I began buying plants I knew they would like, installing bird feeders and baths, and constructing brush piles and dust holes. My efforts have been rewarded many times over.

Birds, I have learned, require shelter from the elements, protection from predators, water, natural food, and nesting sites. I began the venture in my garden by paying attention to the native plant species that already existed and making sure they were retained. I was lucky because I started with a mature assortment of native trees that included oaks, pines, junipers, hollies, and blackgum, all of which established an effective canopy. Native shrubs and small trees at midstory included beautyberry, wild blueberries, persimmon, hawthorn, sparkleberry, and saw palmetto. Underneath it all was a groundcover of wildflowers and creeping vines. To these I added a more native trees, shrubs and herbaceous plants that increased the availability of food and shelter and increased diversity.

Plants are not the only important feature in my yard birds like. I frequently see woodpeckers debarking pine snags and dead limbs. They are searching for insects that hide in the crevices or hollowing out nesting sites. Birds of various kinds use the dirt pathways for their dust baths and grit requirement. A brush pile provides hiding places for mice, garter snakes, lizards, toads, and many insects of immense interest to the wrens and other ground-feeding birds. Rocks incorporated among the flower borders are used as perches for birds and hiding places for tasty ants and beetles. Natural mulch underneath the trees and shrubs is home for worms, roly-polies, millipedes, and other scrumptious morsels. Birdbaths meet water needs.

Since my love affair with the birds, I have become a more responsible environmental steward. I am more tolerant of the insects that manage to damage some of my plants. Not surprisingly, my avian friends' list of gourmet treats closely resembles my list of dreaded pests. The birds devour aphids, cutworms, caterpillars, grasshoppers, and other unsuspecting insects whose sole intent is to dine on my ornamental plantings.

My yard is not a mess of the jumbies as one might assume from this description. It is not a wild, unordered garden, although it is attractive to wildlife. Its diversity offers seasonal change and color that is hard to achieve in the coastal South. It is a place where I enjoy sitting and being immersed in the sights and sounds of nature. Before I realize it, calmness and serenity seep into my most innermost being, and I am refreshed, and my spirits renewed.

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## Dune Restoration – Phase 3

Ocean Ridge Garden Club (ORGC) has completed a third stage of replanting a small stretch of dune along Old Ocean Boulevard by installing native plants favored by pollinators. These include plant hosts for caterpillars, others with flowers that are particularly preferred by butterflies, and some that provide food for both. For instance, caterpillars feed on the leaves and butterflies sip the nectar from flowers of bay cedar, black bead, frog fruit phyla. But yellow top plants attract only the butterflies, while passion flower is a plant of choice only for caterpillars, so these plants must be paired with another species. Each was also carefully positioned according to its level of salt, sun and wind tolerance. The plants are part of Butterfly packs that were donated to the club by the Institute for Regional Conservation along with guidance for planting.

The dune was gifted to the Town of Ocean Ridge over a decade ago, and ORGC has maintained the site by trimming back existing plants. But the dune had gradually been taken over by invasive plants until last year when it became obvious that a drastic make-over was needed. The project leader is Allison Adams, a Master Gardener and the new Chair of ORGC's Beautification & Conservation Committee.

Since dune ecosystems are protected by law in Florida, a local representative at the Department of Environmental Protection was consulted to make sure the club had approval to get started with the first phase in August of 2020. Allison began the project by researching dune-friendly plants to select hardy salt-tolerant species that had deep sand-stabilizing roots and required little maintenance. "The dead plants we removed from the dune were primarily golden creeper. Although dune friendly, it does not like salt spray, said Allison. A group of ORGC members assembled on the dune in August to plant a dozen small saw palmettos. Then in October, the spaces between the palmettos were filled in with dune daisies to provide a ground cover.

Allison said that her committee views the dune as a long-term project since it will always need maintenance. "Over the next year we will continue beautifying the dune with the help of our Garden Club members by adding more plants," she said. As committee member Julia Ward explained, "In addition to restoring the dune, the goal of the project is to create a showcase of native plantings as an example of sustainable conservation that can be replicated all along the Ocean Ridge dune". In doing so, ORGC hopes to increase awareness among beachfront property owners of the benefits of restoring native plants to dune areas.

Pedestrians and bicyclers on Old Ocean are invited to visit the dune regularly to view the progress. The dune is located near the end of Tropical Drive, and is marked by Town of Ocean Ridge signage as a beach access point.

ORGC's Beautification & Conservation Committee has also installed plantings at various sites in Ocean Ridge and has led and/or participated in beach clean-ups. The club also participated in Florida Atlantic University's Million Orchid project to restore native orchids in Florida.

## FFGC History-Our 7th Decade-1985-1994

**1985-1987 President Betty Williams** was installed as a Heritage Oak was planted in Tallahassee commemorating FFGCs 60th Anniversary. Deep South Energy Conference in Mississippi was attended by 51 members and the Deep South Water Conference in Alabama was attended by 6 members. We published *Bee a Winner, Taking a Closer Look, Let Us Pray, Guidelines for Publicity Chairmen* and revision of *Florida Garden Club Manual*. Flower Show Schools symposium was held in Orlando with District VI as host. Renaissance XXV funds were used for Headquarters' rejuvenation to celebrate 25th anniversary of the building, headquarters grounds were partially re-landscaped and new furniture was purchased. We adopted 'Paths of Sunshine' as designation for FFGC roadside beautification. Florida Legislature adopted FFGCs resolution designating state's roadways as "Paths of Sunshine". Thirty-one NCSGC awards and citations, including Bronze Seal for Landscaping Florida House and Silver Seal for work of Laymond M. Hardy. \$1,000 Urban Highway Award, Hilda Fox \$100 Roadside Award, \$100 "green point" subscription contest for *The National Gardener*, \$100 from Shell Oil Energy Program Award, Membership Ext. Citation and Presidential Citations to Mrs. Reese Harris and Mr. Bob Thomas. Garden Club of Jacksonville hosts State Flower Show "Diamond Anniversary" to commemorate 60 years of service, as a gift to citizens of Florida. Fifty-ninth convention hosted by Garden Club of Jacksonville with 811 registrants with the State Flower Show, "Florida—Nature's Bright Gem". FFGC adopted a resolution supporting acquisition of Deering Estate. Wekiva Youth Camp improvements included paddle fans with heavy wire protective enclosures in cabins and wooden fence by pool area. Bartram Trail markers dedicated in Sebastian and Longwood. Gateway Marker at I-95 Welcome Station dedicated in memory of Mrs. Jack Dunlap, FFGC President 1961-1963. We increased *The Florida Gardener* to 20 pages plus covers. Native plants and Wildflower Seed Bank was established. Wekiwa Springs State Park adopted for Deep South Adopt-a-Park regional project. Flower Show School Course 1 was held in Sarasota. Flower Show Symposia held in Orlando was hosted by District VI and Winter Haven. Landscape Design Schools Course IV was held in Sarasota and courses II and III were held in West Palm Beach. Our Penal Therapy Program added a 7th Correctional Institution for support. FFGC honored as the 'Conservation Organization of the Year' by the Florida Wildlife Federation, a trophy was presented by the Governor. We received a Certificate of Recognition from the Sarasota County School Board for Federation's work in Environmental Education. FFGC Headquarters grounds declared a Backyard Habitat by National Wildlife Federation. FFGC members attended National Council/Shell Oil Co. Hazardous Waste Conference in Washington, the Florida Federation of Women's Clubs and FFGC co-sponsored Energy Awareness Seminar. President Williams attended the Governor's First Invitational Conference on Future of Florida Parks. Publication of *FFGC Cookbook, Florida's Finest Gourmet Collection* was authorized. Mrs. Hugh Simmons and Mrs. Augustus F. Williams, Jr. each added two emeralds to the President's pendant. Twenty-first Bartram Trail Marker dedicated in Pensacola. *Bartram in Florida 1774* publication was given as gift to FFGC by editor, Helen Gere Cruickshank. "Bartram Footprints" Tour conducted by Mrs. Charles H. Blanchard. In three days 16 of 121 marker sites were visited. Members aided with the collection of information for the *Florida Breeding Birds Atlas* and attended Deep South Waste Awareness Conference in Chattanooga, TN. National Council convention in Chicago was attended by 27 members from Florida. FFGC hosted a reception honoring Mrs. Carroll Griffin. FFGC won 20 awards including Bronze Seal, Hazel Johnson Trophy for Conservation Education, and the Jessie Conner Award for Environmental Education for SEEK '85.

Our State Flower Show, "Stop, Look and Listen", was hosted by District X at Flagler Museum in Palm Beach. Our sixtieth Annual convention, "Catch the Florida Spirit", was hosted by District VI in Orlando with 719 in attendance.


Blanche Covington Study Course was held at St. Andrews State Recreation Area. SEEK '86 Youth Conference on Coastal Awareness was held at Marineland for 80 students.

Our Junior Gardeners (1985-1986) included 157 clubs, 5,900 students; Intermediate Gardeners (1985-86) included 20 units, 539 students; and High School Gardeners (1985-86) included 19 clubs, 374 students. A total of 440 PATE books were placed with teachers. FFGC Scholarships information was entered into the Florida Department of Education system. Mrs. Dewey R. Villareal, Jr. was appointed by the Governor to serve on the Florida Council of Environmental Education. At the Wekiva Youth Camp 44 varieties of native plants were placed in the pool area. Thirtieth annual Tropical Short course was held, Fiftieth Annual Short Course at UF, 2 Flower show schools symposia, 3 Flower Show Schools, 2 Landscape Design schools, 2 Gardening Study Schools, and the Floral Design Study, 12 basic and 8 advanced, with total registration of 490. *FFGC State Flower Show Manual* completed. FFGC sponsored tours to China and Costa Rica. Membership Brochure, *Join Us*, printed and the second Marketing /Reader interest survey was conducted for *the Florida Gardener* by UF. Three former FFGC Presidents, Mrs. Charles Blanchard, Mrs. Hugh O Simmons and Mrs. Frank W Hewlett, and President Mrs. F. Williams, Jr. were honored by placing their names on the Roll of Honor Wall in Walters Hall at National Council Headquarters. FFGC accepted 2,000 copies of *Wildflowers of the South to Color and Identify*, a gift from Mrs. Raymond Greene. Plaques expressing appreciation were presented to FFGC by the Florida Director of Nature Conservancy and the Regional Director of CARE. A Certificate was received acknowledging over \$3,800 donated by clubs to the Statue of Liberty Fund. President Williams attended the four-day Third National Forestry Conference in Orlando. President Williams serves as a member of the Steering Committee of Florida Citizens Against Throwaways (dissolution in 1993).

**1987 - 1989 President, Wini Ekman, chose as her theme, "Touch Tomorrow Today"**. 1987 in Orlando. Wekiva Youth Camp agreement renewed with the FL Dept of Natural Resources. Blanche Covington Nature Study Course 1987 was held at Archbold Biological Station. A Standing Rule was adopted to hold only one BCNSC in each administration. Intermediate Gardeners (1986-87 year) 6 clubs, 80 members, High School Gardeners (1986-87) 17 units, 606 members. Total of 230 PATE books placed in local schools. FFGC cited for its Outstanding Conservation and Education Activities by the Florida State Fair Authority and a plaque was presented at the Fair's Opening Luncheon. Advanced Landscape Design Seminar held in Tampa. FFGC Horticulture Study Series instituted, course 1 held in West Palm Beach. Renaissance XXV Headquarters Fund Drive concluded with \$24,141 donated. Resolutions adopted in support of designating May 23rd as 'William Bartram Day' in Florida and opposing the Desecration of Indian Burial Grounds. Deep South Regional Convention held in Baton Rouge, LA with FFGC winning 7 awards. 61st Annual FFGC Convention, "Time to Shine-Florida Style" hosted by Tampa Federation Garden Club Circles, at Hyatt Regency, Tampa with 747 registered. Bylaws amended to increase dues and to clarify FFGC scholarship names. NCSGC 1988 Convention, "The World is our Garden", was hosted by FFGC at the Sheraton Bal Harbor. Mrs. Carroll O. Griffin, FFGC President 1967-69, installed as President NCSGC. Seventeen NCSGC Awards received including the Silver Seal for Dr. Gary J. Willifret, Garden Therapy, four publications and nine flower shows. To commemorate the Bicentennial Celebration of the Constitution members planted Constitution gardens and trees in support of Plant-A-Legacy program, first year of Tomorrow's Tree Today contest, members planted 171,888 trees. Glenn Glitter and message was flashed on the scoreboards at FSU football games. A gift by her family in memory of Ella P. Wood, FFGC Past President, established the Ella P. Wood Paths of Sunshine Endowment Fund.

Three new Botanical Gardens are Wilding Arboretum in Jacksonville, Heathcote Botanical Garden in Fort Pierce and Sugar Mills Botanical Garden in Port Orange. Donations to Penal Therapy totaled \$2,183.55. Pilot Horticulture Study Course, Series I, Courses II and III, IV and V completed. FFGC *Flower Arrangement Calendar* added month-at-a-glance section. Mrs. Charles H. Blanchard conducted the Bartram Footprints II Tour. Landscape Design Schools held in Milton, Gainesville and Pensacola. Landscape Design Critics attended the 30th anniversary celebration and National Council Landscape Design symposium at LSU.



New *Program Kits* available at Headquarters. Adopted the Coreopsis as the designated FFGC wildflower. Dr. Fanny-Fern Davis' book, *Natures Seasonal Splendor, Native Plants and Wildflowers*, published. Membership total 27,446. Blanche Covington Nature Study Course was held at O'Leno State Park, High Springs. Hazel Simmons Hodges appointed to serve on the Florida Roadside Beautification Committee. *Paths of Sunshine* cookbook published.

Published *Guidelines for FFGC Convention*. FFGC Groundwater Conference, Tampa, was chaired by Energy Awareness Chairman, Francis Millican. Deep South Convention, Memphis, TN attended by 33 FFGC members. FFGC won the Hubert Owens School Ground Improvement and the Mary Louise Merriwether (for most registered High Schoolers) awards. NCSGC Convention in Houston attended by 28 members. 19 awards and citations including the Bronze Seal for Bartram Footprint I Tour. Annual Convention "Curtain Up-Class Acts" hosted by District VII, Orlando Airport Marriott. Two receptions, one honoring Mrs. Carroll O. Griffin and one introducing the *Paths of Sunshine* cookbook.

**1989 - 1991 President, Elise Haymans**, of Punta Gorda, was our 32nd President and she chose as her theme, "Joy-Commitment-Diversity-A Confluence for Achievement". She also served on National Council of State Garden Clubs, Inc. board of directors. In 1988, FFGC's Penal Therapy Program covered by United Press and appeared in newspapers across USA. The first Ella Wood Paths of Sunshine presented to four Districts. The 1987 NCSGC convention was hosted by FFGC and honored Floridians serving (President Carroll O. Griffin and Deep South Director elect, Jean Villareal)

Members contributed over \$1,500 to the Madison Garden Club to help replace trees destroyed by a tornado. FFGC presented the first 'Ella Wood Paths of Sunshine Award' to Units in Tallahassee. Each District adopted their individual wildflower. A campaign spearheaded by Garden Clubs prevented developers from relocating a 7-mile stretch of William Bartram Historic Highway in Switzerland. Our State Flower Show, "Land Sakes", was hosted by Tampa Federation of Garden Clubs on March 29-30, 1990 at the fairgrounds. The President and 10 members attended National Council Environmental Showcase. Eve Hannahs was appointed by State Secretary of Agriculture to the Endangered Plant Advisory Council. One Blue Star Memorial Marker and one Byway Marker were placed during 1988-'89. The Tree Planting contest yielded a total of 880,535 new trees for 1988 and 1989. Mrs. Woodrow Sayre was appointed by the Governor to serve as a member of Commission on the Future of Florida's Environment. CARE, World Gardening Projects, World's Children and Southwest Indian Foundation received \$11,937 for the two years. FDOT selected over 300 sites for planting wildflowers and native plants on maintained highways as part of the 'Paths of Sunshine' project. Our Land Trust contributions of \$5,858.31 for Tiger Creek Preserve was forwarded to Nature Conservancy. FFGC's total contribution to Tiger Creek Preserve was \$27,839.78. Resolutions adopted in 1989: (1) purchase tract of land east of Camp Blanding for a state park project in perpetuity at Hugh Taylor Birch State Park, (2) com-

mendation to the State of Florida Cabinet for supporting decision to limit development near Wekiva River, (3) proposing first full week in June as Gardening Week, (4) promotion of Monarch Butterfly as national Insect, (5) protest proposed changes in the William Bartram Scenic Highway. Resolutions passed in 1990: (1) urging continuation of ban on oil drilling of the Keys and Everglades Coast, (2) urging acquisition of the BMK Ranch and Seminole Springs, areas important to the preservation of the Wekiva River, and (3) requesting that the State of Florida consider purchase of the Great Blue Heron Rookery, 200 acres of wetlands adjacent to I-10 in Milton area. An Earth Day Proclamation was passed urging protection of the environment. Native Plants and Wildflowers Chairman, Mrs. Robert D. Wilson, compiled "*Wildflower Potpourri*". 12 members attended League of Women Voters Regional Beverage Container Deposit Workshop in Sarasota. Deep South Regional convention in Atlanta attended by 38 members. FFGC hosted a reception honoring NCSGC President Mrs. Carroll O. Griffin, Deep South Regional Director-Elect, Mrs. Dewey R. Villareal, and alternate Director-Elect, Mrs. R. Jordan. FFGC won the Celeste William Special Achievement Award and the Merriwether High School Gardeners Award. Deep South's Wildflowers "Nature's Melody" contest winner was Panhandle Native Plant Club. 29 members attended 60th Annual NCSGC Convention Diamond Jubilee in Rochester, NY. FFGC's High School Speech contest winner was Mary Kate Parks. Molly Karen Pritchard of Orange Park won the NCSGC Scholarship. FFGC won 15 awards including the Bronze Seal. FFGC had 5 entries in Design Classes and 12 entries in Horticulture at the NCSGC International Flower Show. "Changes in the Wind", FFGC's 63rd Convention in St. Petersburg 18-19 April 1989 with 635 registered, was hosted by Winter Haven Council of Garden Clubs. FFGC's Mrs. W. L. Wood, Jr. was appointed to serve as NCSGC Parliamentarian. Scholarship Endowment Fund established by President Haymans. President Haymans selected the Crepe Myrtle, Oleander and Loblolly Bay for the Adopt-A-Highway program. Fourteen Gardening Consultants refresh at UF Short Course. FFGC has 2 Life Member Gardening Consultants. Our June Board meeting was held at UF. We chose Community Land Use Management in Ecuador as our World Gardening Project. The President and three others attended the first Environmental Education Summit in New Jersey. NCSGC and Shell Oil co-sponsored Solid Waste Management Conference in Portland, OR organized by Mrs. Bobby Craig and attended by President Haymans and 3 others. First President's Summit held at Lake Yale in Leesburg with 140 participants. The second President's Summit held at San Pedro Conference Center, Winter Park. Mrs. Dursie Ekman named FFGC's representative to Clean Florida Commission. Conference Table placed in President's Office at Headquarters. New chairs have a plaque attached identifying District donors. One hundred-twenty new chairs were purchased for our auditorium. Two Tropical Short courses held in West Palm Beach during this administration. We held a [dedication of "The Quiet Place" at Camp Wekiva in memory of Billie Johnson](#). NCSGC and Shell Oil sponsor Environmental Conference, "Planet Earth: Whose Garden is it Anyway?" at Hot Springs, AR and attended by 9 FFGC members. FFGC hosted Deep South Regional Convention, "Shore Leave, Jacksonville", with Regional Director, Mrs. Dewey R Villareal, Jr. Ten awards won by FFGC and member clubs. Solid Waste Management Conference held in conjunction with FFGC's 64th State convention "Time, Tides and Treasures", held in San Destin in 1990 with 601 in attendance. AWARE awards FFGC \$500 for EE Workshop on Solid Waste Management held in Tampa. FFGC and FDOT produced wildflower posters and postcards featuring coreopsis. 23 awards accepted by President Haymans at NCSGC Convention in Seattle, WA including Gold Rosette for Best State Flower Show, "Land Sakes". NCSGC awards a Special Achievement Award posthumously to Dr. Fanny-Fern Davis.

President Haymans appointed to three-year term on Executive Committee of newly formed Florida Urban Forestry Council. Both SEEK conferences held at Marineland in St Augustine. FFGC, DOT and Monsanto sponsor Wildflower Conference in Kissimmee.



Bluewater Bay Garden Club, District I, received \$1,000 from ALCOA Aluminum for recycling project. FFGC and Florida Department of Natural Resources co-sponsor Acidic Deposition Conference in Tampa. 12 FFGC members attend AWARE Retreat on Energy Issues at San Pedro Center. "Past Reflections...Future Vision" State Flower Show in Tallahassee. 39 pilgrims trace William Bartram's footprints "along the Gulf Coast with Bartram". 22nd Bartram Marker in the state was dedicated in Switzerland. Blanche Covington Nature Study Courses held at Camp Keystone and Withlacoochee State Park. FFGC awards 9 scholarships totaling \$12,750 to Florida scholars. Pioneer Horticulture Study Course completed in West Palm Beach. A seventh course added to feature "Grandmothers Garden" Workshop. Elise Haymans' Butterfly Sanctuary dedicated at Charlotte Harbor Environmental Center (for more info:

Florida has total of 22 butterfly sanctuaries. A Desert Storm Memorial Garden featuring crepe myrtles was planted at Naval Air Station Pensacola.



New Adult volunteer and counselor cabins constructed at Wekiva Youth Camp. Resolutions adopted include supporting Monroe County's petition urging FDOT to designate Highway 1 as Harry S. Truman Blue Star Overseas Memorial Highway and urging the Governor and the Legislature to maintain and continue full funding of the Bureau of Recreational Lands Management, Division of Parks and Recreation. FFGC contributed \$10,000 to NCSGC Friendship Garden at the National Arboretum. FFGC membership is 27,334. We have 443 High School Gardeners. The Scholarship Fund reaches goal of \$160,000. Scholarship on Environmental Issues, honoring Mary Jo Clayton Sanders, in amount of \$3,500 approved. Scholarship honoring Velma Gwinn increased to \$1,500.

Landscape Design School, Series 22, was sponsored by District VIII. Coreopsis designated as State Wildflower by Florida Legislature. Sam's Club donation of \$1,000 used for Flowering Tree Landscape Project at I-95 Welcome Center. FFGC honored outgoing Regional Director, Mrs. Dewey R. Villareal, Jr. at Deep South Convention. FFGC sponsored new Deep South Regional award of \$80 honoring Mrs. Charles H. Blanchard for outstanding efforts promoting William Bartram and his ideals. Penal Therapy contributions total \$4,746.75 for 1989-91. Fiftieth Anniversary of the FFGC Library. Bylaws amended to read "Vice President to become President-Elect October 1 of even numbered years". FFGC 65th state Convention, "Fast Forward '91," hosted by District XII, held in Miami with 598 in attendance. FFGC brought home 34 awards from NCSGC Convention including Silver Seal Award for FFGCs entry "ECHO" (Educational Concerns for Hunger Organization), Garden Club of Deland won 1st Exxon \$500 Civic Development Award. FFGC won \$1,000 Operation Wildflower Award for Rural Highways. Ellen Griffin scholarship awarded to Larry Arthur Alden of Tallahassee. Two emeralds were added to the Presidents Pin for 89-91 and 91-93 administration.

**1991 - 1993 President Addie Lou Harris** from Deerfield Beach chose as her theme, "Unity Through Sharing". State Flower Show "Past Reflections... Future Visions" was held in Tallahassee.

Wild Pine Nature Center was established as an educational environmental center/outdoor lab. SEEK Conference held at Marine Science Station, Crystal River. Blanche Covington Nature Study Course held at Wekiva with study of "Project Learning Tree". FFGC served as hostess to the National Council's Winter Executive Board Meeting in San Destin. President Addie Lou Harris and Bob Thomas represented NCSGC at Chelsea Flower Show in England and won a Silver Gift Award. At our January Board meeting a celebration was held for completion of 30' by 18' addition to Headquarters and complete refurbishing of the rest of our headquarters building. Governor Lawton Chiles presented President Addie Lou Harris with the Environmental Education Award for outstanding program at Camp Wekiva. District X gave \$1,000 for landscaping at Headquarters. Junior Gardeners registered in Florida (including 2,000 in Virgin Islands) totaled 9,758. Tropical Short Course was held at Mounts Botanical Gardens, West Palm. University of Florida Short Course was titled "Tough Plants for Tough Times". FFGC had representation at the Bartram Footprints Tour IV to Philadelphia, PA and conference held in Savannah, GA. FFGC donated to the gazebo at AMERIFLORA '92. Our 12 districts planted 455,502 trees. The Deep South Convention was held in Biloxi, MS with nine delegates attending. National convention, "Reaching for the Gold", was held in Philadelphia, PA. FFGC won a Bronze Seal and Wekiva Youth Camp won the Silver Seal Marjory Stoneman Douglas Award. FFGC Board Meeting and 66th annual Convention, "Discovery", was held in West Palm Beach with 630 registrations. NCSGC President Mrs. James C. Dawson attended our Pre-convention. The Blanche Covington Nature Study Course was held at Wakulla Springs. SEEK conference was held at Big Pine Key "Sea Camp". Donations to CARE and World's Children Fund totaled \$5,830. Landscape Design Courses were held in Tallahassee by the Ft. Myers-Lee County Council. Horticulture Study Courses were held in Miami.

FFGC established the Hurricane Andrew Tree Fund. Due to Hurricane Andrew, the FFGC 1992 State Flower Show, "A New World", was moved from Miami area to coincide with 1993 Convention in Orlando. We saw the successful completion of six more "Holiday Happenings" by Bob Thomas. FFGC established 'Hall of Fame' honor. \$79,000 was added to our Scholarship Fund. 3 new publications: *Conservascaping*, *Installations Workbook* and *Shall we Pray* were added. We purchased a Swan Computer and Panasonic Printer, purchased new light fixtures for the assembly room and foyer, and 6 chairs for the President's Office. IBM donated a PSI computer and printer to FFGC. New floral designs for Headquarters designed by Bob Thomas. Donations made to Headquarters included 2 table lamps for the foyer, a new coffee pot, a FAX machine, 3 secretarial chairs and room dividers for the new addition. Our board/Pre-convention dinner were hosted by the AWARE committee. Scholarships were established honoring James and Edna Crowl and W. Reese Harris. 6,444 Youth Gardeners were registered in Florida. Jennifer Cheerier of Tallahassee was the winner of a \$4000 NCSGC Scholarship. Three Flower Show Schools held in Districts VII, XII and by the Tampa Federation. A lily was propagated and named "Addie Lou" by Jean Wooten, Miami and Robert Fuchs, President of RF Orchids, propagated and registered an orchid "Addie Lou" honoring President Harris.

**1993 - 1995 President Beth Wilson** of Valparaiso chose as her theme, "Share the Spirit of Gardening through Love, Labor and Laughter". During her administration, FFGC sponsored the first series of Environmental Studies Schools and 13 Environmental Consultants were accredited. Two series of Landscape Design Schools were held in Tallahassee and Ft Myers. 19 new Landscape Design critics were accredited. 22 series Floral Design Study Courses were held. Four Flower Show Symposia were held. Six series of Flower Show Schools were held with 47 new judges accredited. Two Gardening Study Courses and Four Short Courses were held over the 2 years. Two Penal Therapy judged Horticulture Shows were held at Avon Park Correctional Institute. Two SEEK conferences were held at UF (both named finalists in the Governor's Environmental Education Awards program, SEEK '93 received NCSGC Bronze Seal). Two Blanche Covington Nature Study Courses were held. Over 6,500 youth gardeners were registered; 6000 Junior, 383 Intermediate and 324 High School Gardeners. Our High School Gardeners program received Deep South Award #14 for 1994 and 1995. The first FFGC sponsored Wildflower conference was held. FFGC and FDOT collaborated in planting 2,655 acres of wildflowers, in printing a new wildflower poster and in compiling the booklet, *Wildflowers in Florida*. FFGC presented a 'Paths of Sunshine' Award to FDOT maintenance units at 1994 and 1995 conventions. Seventeen NCSGC/Shell Oil PETALS grants were received statewide. FFGC was represented at Mexico's Federacion Nacional de Asociaciones y Clubes de Jardineras Horticulture Seminar held in Orlando. New Life members totaled NCSGC, 49; FFGC, 148; Hall of Fame, 64. Contributions given by generous members during 1993-95: NCSGC Seed Court Garden, \$4,000; Nature Conservancy's 'Join the Scrub Jay Circle' \$8,000; World Gardening, \$8,506.80; ECHO and Hurricane Andrew Tree Project added to World Gardening projects. Library additions included 7 NCSGC tapes of Floral Design Courses, a slide program of the 1993 State Flower Show, "A New World". FFGC received NCSGC Gold Rosette for the best State Flower Show in 1993. Our Bylaws were amended; Membership dues raised to (a) \$.50, (b) \$2.24, (c) \$5.00 and \$2.50, Life membership fee raised to \$100, and Affiliate dues increased to \$25. FFGC was represented at NCSGC Conventions in Stamford, CT and Dallas, TX and at Deep South Regional Conventions at Knoxville, TN and Augusta, GA. FFGC was represented by 6 members at NCSGC Seed Court Garden dedication. Hurricane Andrew Tree Project donations totaled of \$23,111.28, including an Urban Forestry Grant of \$17,548 and 405 eight-to-ten-foot trees planted at 9 Homestead schools. Daylily 'Beth Wilson' hybridized by Jean Wooten, Coral Gables Garden Club. At Headquarters,

we renovated the stage area of the auditorium, installed a public address system and security system, purchased a sofa for the library, received lavalier microphone donated by FCNAFSJ. Three names were placed on the Guardian of Gardening Wall: Mrs. Robert D. Wilson, Mrs. Charles H. Blanchard, Mrs. Walter P. Glover. Inez Brooker and former FFGC member Carolyn Smith represented NCSGC at Chelsea Flower Show 1994, receiving Silver Medal Award. Two series of Horticulture Study Courses held in Miami and Punta Gorda. Wekiva Youth Camp, celebrated 20th anniversary in 1993 and instituted 'Wekiva Wheels', special registration volunteers. We approved building a free-standing Canteen facility. FFGC endorsed the management of Wekiva Geo Park as one entity that no further development for the public be allowed in Wekiva Springs area, and established a teaching herbarium. Floral designs were exhibited at Walt Disney World's International Flower/Garden Festival Mother's Day celebrated at EPCOT in 1994, and Cypress Gardens in 1995 and an FFGC exhibit was displayed on Earth Day at EPCOT in 1993-94. We computerized the late Fanny-Fern Davis' 10-year study, "*The Flowering Dates of Florida's Wildflowers*" and approved the printing of the study. We approved the use of our 'Glenn Glitter' logo on Apalachee-Big Bend Girl Scout Council Badge. Table designs were made for Governor's Environmental Awards Banquet in 1993, 1994, and 1995. Resolutions passed included (1) endorsing the continuance of operations of USDA's Sub-tropical Horticulture Research Station, Chapman Field, Miami, (2) objecting to the usurption of public lands at Bill Baggs Cape Recreation Area (Key Biscayne) and any other state recreation area, (3) supporting the Guana Tolomato Matanzas National Estuarine Research Reserve in Ponte Vedra, and (4) supporting the inclusion of the Sopchoppy River in the National Wild and Scenic River System. FFGC nominee, Sarah Bailey, named Florida's 1994 'Woman of the Year' in Agriculture. The Governor's Cabinet and Senate passed resolutions proclaiming the first full week of June as Florida Garden Week. A dedication of an accessible boardwalk for the disabled at Wekiva Springs State Park made possible by Garden Club donations totaling \$11,000. FFGC received 'Take Pride in America' and 'Take Pride in Florida' awards for state-wide tree planting projects. Nine college scholarships were awarded through our Scholarship Endowment Fund. FFGC became the first organization to join 'Friends of Florida State Parks' in 1994. The Monarch butterfly chosen as the official FFGC Butterfly. Two International tours to Australia and New Zealand were offered. 1994 Convention, "Love, Labor and Laughter" held in San Destin, hosted by District I with 604 registered. NCSGC President Mrs. Graem Yates and Deep South Regional Director, Mrs. K. O. Tubb attended. 1995 Convention, "Artistry in Gardening" held in Orlando, hosted by District VII, with 724 registered. "Artistry in Space", 25th State Flower Show, held at Orlando Expo Center in conjunction with our 69th State Convention.

## Blue Star & Gold Star Families Memorial Markers

To All Latina: This is just to give you a brief overview of the Blue Star and Gold Star Families Memorial Markers activity during your entire two-year tenure as FFGC President. (This information does not appear in this chairman's annual report for the 2021 Convention)

During the last two years there have been a total of **14 new markers ordered** consisting of 12 Blue Star and 2 Gold Star Families markers. This is one of the better two-year periods for marker orders especially considering the likely impact of Covid-19 on such activities. To put this in perspective, during the overall period from 1989 through 2000 only 3 markers were ordered in Florida.

The other accomplishment of note during your tenure as President is that across the state there were also **14 existing markers which were restored** to "like-new" condition. This appears to have been an all-time high in terms of marker restorations during a two-year period.

I am very proud of the FFGC clubs for their efforts during such a challenging time.


